Maryland


Lapidum Reroute – Mike Hall has a meeting with the East Coast Greenway group on September 13th and will bring up the reroute topic again.

The Havre de Grace sections have been cut and are clear. A new volunteer has helped with clearing debris and notifying us of downed trees.

Rt1 to Fishermans Park at Conowingo was recently cut and cleared as well.

Pennsylvania

After a few years of joint work, Lancaster Conservancy has allowed the Mason-Dixon Trail System to open a reroute of the M-DT through Hellam Hills Nature Preserve. This reroute will increase the length of the trail in the Preserve from 2.5 mi. to 6.8 mi. The added points of interest are the climb up Buzzards Roost to a view of the Susquehanna River and Lancaster County, more views of the Susquehanna from Wildcat Bluff, the ruin of an old dam and reservoir, views down into Wildcat Run and springs that feed it. Blazing coming soon!



Delaware

Recent trail users have discovered that the section of the trail in Delaware where Maps 8 and overlap, between the MD-DE State



Line to Pleasant Valley Road, DE, has been posted with a No Trespassing sign by landowner by Delmarva Power. As a result, a new route will need to be designed. In the coming weeks, trail users can check for a new map and route linked at the trail status page (under map 8) at https://masondixontrail.wixsite.com/mdts/trail-status.



Volunteer



1. TRAIL SPOTTER

Someone who hikes/walks/runs a section of trail and reports any problem they may spot, such as: a downed trees, missing or confusing blazes, or other problems.

2. TRAIL ANGEL

A volunteer that provides support on any portion of trail, whenever and however they are capable.

3. WORK DAY VOLUNTEER

By participating in a work day event, volunteer group trail maintenance, or construction project you will be helping improve the trail network for all to enjoy.

4. TRAIL SECTION MAINTAINER

Become an official maintainer for a designated section of trail. Depending on your location across the three states, we can help find you a section of trail near your home that could use your routine support.

5. TRAIL COORDINATOR

Maintains a list of trail sections and the maintainer(s) for each section, recruits and oversees trail maintainers and work, records work performed, identifies problems and requests a team to assist, reports trail conditions at meetings, and attends quarterly meetings.

6. TRAIL DIRECTOR

Coordinates with the appropriate state and local government agencies, coordinates with appropriate non-profit organizations, interfaces with property owners, reports issues to the board, and attends quarterly meetings.

7. SHUTTLE SERVICE PROVIDER

Shuttle service providers offer shuttle services to long distance hikers along the Mason- Dixon Trail. The ideal candidate should have a good size vehicle, preferably 4- or all-wheel drive and in good working order, current insurance and a general geographic knowledge of the area surrounding the Mason-Dixon Trail.
