

Trail Maintenance Report

April – June 2017

EASTERN SECTION

Don Barber & Ingrid C. Fox of CCTC recently mowed from US Rt.1 to Stabler Rd. Tom Wheatley also mowed and weed whacked the area by long causeway over wetlands. It requires crossing some train tracks.

White Clay Creek Area

■ The Preserve work was an Eagle Scout project financed by Friends of Preserve and was a direct replacement of an existing bridge (15 yrs old) suffering from bank erosion. The replacement bridge was relocated about 50 feet to avoid bank erosion section on a s mall stream (Map 9 E-W approx. mile 21.1). New bridge construction used standardize state park design (5' wide decking and 42" high hand rails on both sides). Material cost is about \$1800 for 20' long bridge.

Iron Hill Area

 Friends of Iron Hill and local mountain bikers have installed marker posts at major trail intersections that include M-D Trail. Prior to this the trails were not really marked. M-D blazes were left alone because there are many small unmarked trails. A new trail map will be issued that includes paragraph write-up of M-D trail. Mike Ott represented M-D Trail in this process.

M-D Trail along Christina River in Newark (Map 9)

This approx. 5-mile segment (property of City of Newark Parks) is being maintained by Wilmington Trail Club (Coordinated by Gary Kirk) with permission of City of Newark Parks. For 2nd quarter of 2017, 5 volunteers worked 17 hours with info reported to Newark Parks.

Elk Neck Forest

■ Mike Ott checked the blazes in the North East area and they looked in good shape. He also hiked and trimmed the trail from where it enters Elk Neck Forest to just before Landfill Road (Map 8 W-E mile 0 to 1.5). Not a lot of underbrush so most of trimming was on tree branches protruding into the trail or blocking sight line to next blaze. Blaze was good to OK, not real good in two spots where very hard to follow. Guessing it had not been trimmed in more than a year (3 hr).

CENTRAL SECTION

■ R. Shakeshank cut back multiflora rose south of Quarry Rd. L. Lambert, R. Busey & D. Herman hauled out a large, heavy speaker & a complete car seat; cut back rhodies from Cold Creek to about the halfway mark; collected about a 1/4 bag of trash between the Gorge and Papermill Road (things still pretty clean! yippee!) and cut back multiflora rose. F. Ziemski & Son weed whacked between Lay & Burk Rd. R & D Strine also weed whacked and lopped in the Peach Bottom area.

WESTERN SECTION

- T. Schmidt weed whacked and lopped the Holtwood Dam area section.
 Paul Yatabe cleaned up along Oakland Run. The York Hiking Club Thursday Crew (J. McCoy, F. Kempft, T. Morley, R. & D. Strine, B. Frick, Morgan, T. Schmidt, J. Hooper, D. Lukes) worked 123 hours clearing blowdowns, cutting brush, replacing bridge decking, and re-digging trail between Otter Creek Campground and Long Level
- J. Hooper scouted PA State Game Land #305 for an alternate route for the Western Terminus of the trail.

Mason-Dixon Quarterly Hike and Meeting

Quarterly Hike and Meeting Sat., Aug 19, 2017

Hike: 9:00 am Meeting: 1:00 pm

This will be a work hike at Gifford Pinchot State Park. We will initially meet at the Sunnyside Pavilion near the day use parking lot within the park. To get to the Sunnyside Pavilion turn from Alpine RD into the Conewago Day Use Area RD. Drive all the way to the end of the road at the lake's edge, turn right and proceed around the elongated parking area. When you get to the end of the elongated, one-way parking area and start to loop back, you should see the Sunnyside Pavilion on your left. (GPS coordinates for parking near the pavilion are 40.072731, -76.887327). A map showing the parking and pavilion is available at www.mason-dixontrail.org/mdt hike mtg schedule.html. The M-DT goes behind the Pavilion as it migrates from the shared bike path onto the Alpine Trail. The plan is to have 3 teams blazing the M-DT within Pinchot State Park as follows:

- Team 1 Blaze from the Squire Gratz RD western boundary of the park to PA177, a distance of 1.5 miles.
- **Team 2** Blaze from PA177 to the day use area, a distance of 3 miles.
- **Team 3** Blaze from the Alpine RD eastern park boundary of the park to the day use area, a distance of 2.6 miles.

Teams 1 and 3 have less blazing distance but have to drive further to stage vehicles at each end of their blazing area. The goal is to get all 3 areas blazed by around 12 noon. Paint and brushes will be provided. Wear clothing that you don't mind getting paint on. Also bring a set of loppers, a day pack, water, snacks, M-DT Map 2 and a lunch. This was the first of the meetings to discuss plans for laying out trails this winter.

M-DTS Publishes 1st Digital Section Map

Back in early 2016 the Mason-Dixon Trail System entered into a partnership with avenzamaps.com. Avenza is a company that specializes in providing maps for smart phones by way of their free apps for iOS, Android and Windows based phones. They have over a half million maps available from various publishers that they partner with. Some of their outdoor related partners include the New York-New Jersey Trail Conference, National Geographic, National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service and many other entities. Some of these maps are free and some can be purchased.

We initially experimented with offering free georeferenced versions of existing maps. Then we published a few free maps that were created to be georeferenced. Now we can say that we have published the first of 10 upcoming georeferenced section maps of the Mason-Dixon Trail.

Our first map is Map 4, which covers from South of Wrightsville, PA to Otter Creek Campground, PA. This map will sell for \$1.99. We will be releasing the other 9 maps in our M-DT map set over the next 2.5 years. These maps will also be the basis for the next generation of paper maps for the M-DT.

The proceeds from the sale of this and future digital maps will help the non-profit Mason-Dixon Trail System to continue to be able to maintain and improve the 200 mile Mason-Dixon Trail. Conowingo Trails Day

On National Trails Day, Saturday, June 3 2017, 6 Mason-Dixon Trail System members joined 7 Exelon employees and 5 local volunteers to perform trail work on the M-DT around Conowingo Dam. The work crew was divided into 5 teams, four of which were co-led by a Mason-Dixon member and an Exelon employee.

Team 1 was led by two volunteers from Friends of Conowingo Dam. They trimmed limbs and brush with loppers going south from Fishermans Park. Team 2, led by Jim McCoy, re-dug the climb up from Fishermans Park. Team 3, co-led by Linda Lambert and the section's maintainer, Rick Clark, who is an Exelon employee, brush cut and trimmed from US Rt. 1 south to Fishermans Park with a string trimmer and loppers. Team 4, led by Jim Hooper, cleared blowdowns, brush and limbs with a chain saw, string trimmer and loppers from US Rt. 1 north for 1.6 miles. Team 5, led by Tom Morley, cleared brush and several blowdowns in the Hopkins Cove



area with a string trimmer, chainsaw and loppers. We didn't have enough people to reach the few blowdowns in the ½ mile section between Teams 4 and 5. We'll save that for another day.

Although the turnout of local volunteers was less than hoped for, the work completed was more than expected. Everyone seemed to enjoy the work and the free hot dogs and drinks that followed. Thanks to everyone who help.

The M-DTS Newsletter is published about four weeks in advance of each of the four M-DTS board meetings held annually. Submissions are welcomed.
