History Along the Trail Bridge Burning¹

n June 1863, General Lee decided to invade the north with the major objective of capturing Harrisburg, which was a railroad hub. This hub was key to the east-west traffic in the north. Before Gettysburg battle, the Confederates got the furthest north of the Mason-Dixon line at the Susquehanna River.

There were limited places that had bridges across the Susquehanna. One of the bridges was the Wrightsville-Columbia Bridge. This bridge was a wooden bridge with a cart way and railroad under the covered part. In addition, it had a towpath for hauling canal boats across the river. It was the longest covered bridge in the world. Railroad engines were pulled across the bridge to avoid embers from the wood burners lighting the bridge on fire. Below the bridge was a dam that retained the water so that the canal could operate. This photo shows the piers of the civil war bridge next to the Route 462 bridge.

Lee sent Major General Jubal Early's division to York County. One of his brigades was Brig. Gen. John Gordon's brigade. His brigade was sent to York City. After ransoming the city of York, Gordon proceeded toward Wrightsville on what is now Rt 462.

The Federal forces did not have any regular army forces to oppose the Confederates. Therefore, the main forces were Militia. Batteries were placed in Columbia to defend the bridge and the dam crossings. Explosives were placed to drop one of the bridge spans. Rifle pits were dug west of Wrightsville. Two bridges across the Conewago Creek were burned. Railway stock and everything that could be moved was taken across the river to keep the Confederates from getting them.

On June 28, Gordon advanced toward Wrightsville. The Union forces were so small relative to the Confederates that they were only able to hold out for a little over an hour before retreating to Wrightsville, the bridge and then across the river.

When the Confederates neared the bridge, the fuses were lit. However, the charges were not large enough to bring the span down. The Federals then drenched a span with coal oil

Apollo Park Shelter


A joint effort of the M-DTS and York Hiking Club has built a new backpacker shelter in Apollo Park, York County. The material was bought using a grant by the Harley-Davidson Foundation. Volunteers have been working every Thursday since the ground thawed in March. Almost 500 volunteer man-hours have been spent in this effort.

The new shelter is a 16x10 foot shelter based on the YHC's AT Clarks Ferry shelter on Peters Mountain. It has two bunk beds. Using the floor and the beds, it can sleep 6. In addition, it has a porch with a bench seat. At one end of the bench seat, it has a fireproof shelf under the overhead for backpacker stoves.

Please see the map below for the location. The shelter is above Boyd's Run (see Map 4, 12.6 miles east-bound).

We are negotiating with York County Park on the rules for using the shelter. They insist that you make reservations to use the shelter by contacting York County Parks Office (717) 840-7440, Monday-Friday 8:30 to 4:30 or on weekends email parks@yorkcountypa.gov. The stay limit is two consecutive nights. No open fires are permitted. Use a backpacker stove on the fireproof shelf.

and kerosene. The bridge was lit on fire. However, the fire was not limited to one span. However, the fire became very intense and the entire bridge burned.

In addition, embers from the firestorm came down in Wrightsville and lit buildings on fire. The town

residents turned out in force to fight the fire. Gordon ordered his men to help.

Unable to cross the river by the dam due to high water and the threat of a battery on the Columbia side, Gordon ended up withdrawing and heading back to Gettysburg to fight in the battle.

Backpacking Info

The Mason-Dixon Trail System website at www.mason-dixontrail.org now has a Backpacking Info section. This section discusses various aspects of backpacking the Mason-Dixon Trail whether it is just one night, a week long trip or even a thru-hike of the M-DT. The informational areas within this section discuss and present information on:

Camping Info This was an existing section on the site that has been expanded to now include 13 different places where you can camp near the trail as well as general/contact information.

Lodging Info This includes motels and other types of lodging that are within 5 miles of the trail.

Miscellaneous Info Tidbits of wisdom on various aspects of backpacking that will make one's trip better.

Food Supply/Mail Drops This area goes into great detail on how to secure short term and long term supplies as well as getting mail drops along the M-DT.

Taxis, Shuttles, and Public Transportation This area talks about how to get to and from the trail and how to get off the trail if the need arises. It contains info on taxis, buses and trains. We are also looking for shuttle service providers that can earn money shuttling hikers along the M-DT.

Water Sources Here we talk about water sources along the M-DT including how to filter water, good and questionable water sources and water available from various businesses.
