History Along the Trail

Ferries Across the Susquehanna

Before one could take the bridges across the Susquehanna one had to take a ferry. There were many ferries, usually named after the operator or location. When the owner changed, the name of the ferry was changed. Before the dams, the river varied in depth through out the year. Some of the ferries could only operate when the water was up. The following is a partial list of the ferries starting at the mouth of the river. There may be ferries that are missed. The renaming of ferries when ownership changed makes it confusing. Also, due to the dams, a lot of the original locations are under water.



LOWER SUSQUEHANNA FERRY

Was established in 1695 and ran from Stockett's Town (Havre de Grace) to Perryville near the Rogers Tavern. Operated for 170 years connecting the post road on both sides of the river. The post road was the major road between Baltimore and Philadelphia in colonial times.

UPPER FERRY

Also known as Bell's Ferry, Smith's Ferry and Creswell's Ferry—started in 1727, ran from Lapidum to Port Deposit.

RAILROAD FERRY

Operated 1837 to 1866 between Havre de Grace and Perryville to haul railroad cars of the Philadelphia, Wilmington & Baltimore Railroad.

BALD FRY'S FERRY

Also known as Friar's and started in 1695 near Conowingo Dam at a ford. Both Lafayette and Comte de Rochambeau used the ford and ferry to move troops to Virginia during the Revolutionary War.

PEACH BOTTOM FERRY

Was located near where the nuclear power plant is. Started around 1738. Used by the Mason and Dixon survey team on Nov 7, 1765.

OLSON'S FERRY

One end was near Muddy Creek.

MCCALLS FERRY

Also known as Ashmore's / Stevenson's / Nelson's / McMillen's / White's. Started about 1740 with one end at McCall's Ferry Road.

REED'S FERRY

Also known as Fulton's, ran from above Otter Creek to Pequea.

BURKHOLDER'S/SHANKS FERRY

Operated from 1762 to 1920's. A small village was on the York side with a post office that operated between 1892 and 1908.

BLUE ROCK FERRY

Ran from Dritt Mansion to Blue Rock Road. Originally Thomas Cresap's ferry in 1730. Became Myers then Dritt Ferry.

WRIGHTS FERRY

Operated from 1730 to 1901. Wrightsville was named after John Wright. There is a Wright mansion in Columbia, PA (originally called Wright's Ferry).

ANDERSON'S FERRY

Also known as Coyle's or Glatz's, ran from Accomac Inn to Marietta. Granted an official charter in Nov 1742. In 1825, the first metal hulled steamboat named "Codorus" was operated in this area.

VINEGAR FERRY

Ran from Marietta to Conowingo Creek. Corruption of Christian Winiker's name.

LOWES FERRY

Lowes (Logan's or Wilke's) from Bainbridge to the Gut/Brunner Island).


Quarterly Hike and Meeting

HIKE/TRAIL MARKING – 9:00 AM

White Clay Creek State Park (Delaware) Nature Center Parking Area. There is an \$8 charge for out-of-staters. Mike has limited number of free paking passes for the boardmembers, so please car pool with one of them.

MEETING - 1:00 PM

Newark Free Library Community Room (750 Library Ave), at intersection of Main Street and Rt 72 (Library Ave). Access is only from Main Street (1-way street) westbound. Follow signs for library.



DIRECTIONS TO HIKE/TRAIL MARKING

Lancaster-Strasburg Area:

Traveling south on Rt-896 (about 9 miles past Rt 1) you will enter Delaware. About 1/2 mile further, turn left onto Hopkins Road. Go about 0.8 miles, then turn left onto gravel road, (just before the bridge over White Clay Creek) following signs for the Nature Center. In about 0.3 miles the parking area will be on the left

Maryland Area:

Either I-95 or Rt-273 to Newark Delaware. Take Rt-896 north out of Newark. Just after passing Carpenter Area of White Clay Creek State park on the right, turn right onto Hopkins Road. Go about 0.8 miles, then turn left onto gravel road, (just before the bridge over White Clay Creek) following signs for the Nature Center. In about 0.3 miles the parking area will be on the left.

THE HIKE/TRAIL MARKING

The objective will be to officially open a new section of the Mason Dixon Trail that is being re-designated onto the newly completed Tri State Trail and existing trails in Carpenter area of White Clay Creek State Park. Ironic that parts of trails being used in Carpenter are where the Mason Dixon trail was routed 10 years ago.

The trails in the White Clay Creek (both Pa and De) are marked by newest style of posts that have 4 x 4 wood post with a slip over PVC square tube and cap. Decals applied to the side of post are used to mark the trails. NO BLAZING IS USED, and any possible trail intersection is clearly marked. The purpose of the hike is to apply Mason Dixon trail decals to the posts. This will also be an opportunity to hike the newly completed Tri-State trail. The hike starts at Delaware Nature Center and trailhead for Tri State Trail. The hike covers:

- 3.0 miles Tri-State trail segment
- 1.2 miles connector and Carpenter trails that M-D trail will use
- 0.4 miles return on Creek Road Trail (replaced part of M-D trail)

The net addition to Mason Dixon Trail System is 3.9 miles.

President's Message

MAINTAINERS

FURNACE RUN

Tim and I met with the Game Commission land manager about the culvert at the junction of Furnace Run and Saw Mill Run. They do not have any equipment big enough to remove the culvert so we have to look at another solution to crossing Furnace Run.

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The Mason-Dixon Trail System

The Mason-Dixon Trail connects the Appalachian Trail with the Brandywine Trail. This 196 mile long trail starts at Whiskey Springs on the Appalachian Trail, in Cumberland County, PA and heads east towards the Susquehanna River, passing through Gifford Pinchot State Park en route. The trail then follows the west bank of the Susquehanna River south to Havre de Grace in Maryland. Across the river, the M-DT continues east, passes through Elk Neck State Forest, then on to Iron Hill Park in Delaware, north along the Christina River and White Clay Creek to the White Clay Creek Preserve. The trail then heads northeast to its eastern terminus at Chadds Ford, PA on the banks of the Brandywine River.
