

WINTER 1986 - 1987 NEWSLETTER

As is usual in such matters the suggestor ended up by "VOLUNTEERING" to edit this newsletter on a trial basis (say one year) and then have the club officials review this effort and decide if it should be continued, what changes to it are necessary, etc. My original suggestion stated that items for publication could include:

- * reports from trail maintainers (after informing appropriate trail supervisors), describing trail conditions, problems that have been solved, whether help is needed, etc.
- * highlights of minutes of meetings, of course.

Since your editor lives near Pinchot State Park, his contacts and hiking experiences for the Eastern part of the Trail have been rather limited and, as a result, this newsletter will be primarily news of the Western part of the Trail.

It is hoped that members will contribute reports & news items from all sections of the trail so that future newsletters will provide a more balanced coverage of trail happenings. Your comments, both constructive as well as destructive are encouraged. Postcards are perfectly acceptable. Any nasty comments may receive minor editing prior to publication.

MAINTENANCE INFORMATION/UPDATE

Quite a few good things have been happening recently in regard to the maintenance of the MDT:

- * The stretch between Greenbranch and Cuff's Run has finally been cleared. After efforts by the York Hiking Club and various individuals, Ron Gray and Charles Crouse recently finished the Joh of sawing through the blowdowns. This has been a very troublesome stretch that has never been cleared previously and has presented quite a problem as it is very rocky and has been obstructed by numerous large blowdowns.
- * Bill Bryan, a Boy Scout from Port Deposit, MD. will be rebuilding the switchbacks from Mill Creek (near Lock 12) to where the Trail crests to overlook the River below Holtwood Dam. This work is in connection with Bill's efforts to become an Eagle Scout.
- * John and Marion Schultz, Phone are the new maintainers for the loop from River Road up along Mill Creek, under the power lines below Holtwood Dam and ending at River Road again near the Holtwood Dam Breast.
- * Ken Foster, Phone is assuming maintenance responsibilities for the trail through Apollo Park, a York County Park. Ken is a very capable maintainer and has been mentioned in previous minutes as having hiked the MDT from end to end.
- * Ron Gray has recently signed agreements with PP&L representatives and Paul Dellinger, a Wrightsville Real Estate Broker, to permit relocation of the Trail near Accomac Inn North of Wrightsville. This relocation will make a camping site with water supply available. Assisting in this relocation will be Ronald Whitman,

 Ron has agreed to assume some maintenance responsibilities for the Trail for some distance North of Wrightsville. Negotiations on the extent of the distance are now in progress.
- * As a final item, all readers of this newsletter are urged to contribute to the Trail maintenance effort. Ron Gray or Turner Darden will be glad to hear from you.

 The 36 mile walk will begin at the Horseshoe Trail near Ludwigs Corner, Pa. and will end at Hagley Museum, just north of Wilmington, Del. There are options for ending the hike at the 12, 22, or 28 mile check points where shuttle service back to your car parked at Hagley Museum will be offered. Food and drink will also be available at these check points.

Buses will leave Hagley Museum at 5:00 AM, and trail information will be given to hikers on the bus. Cost, including bus and food, is \$5.00 for WTC members, \$6.00 for others. Those completing the hike can purchase a special patch for \$1.00.
